March Newsletter by Pastor Eric Reliability of the Bible Part One

Although the Bible is the most read, most published book of all time and has the most ancient manuscripts going back thousands of years, it is also the most criticized. There are those who don't want it to be true and have been told it is not reliable. Most of these higher criticisms revolve around the text having some minor discrepancies among manuscripts or the fact that men have copied from the original. I guess they expect the original to have been scanned or screen shot from an iPhone, but I digress. There are many books written to address these textual higher criticisms and we'll get to that in part two. Below is a portion of a Lutheran Witness article by our Synod President Harrison about how Jesus viewed the Bible:

"The Bible is about Jesus. Jesus cajoled His contemporaries who read the Bible but missed the point. "You search the Scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that bear witness about Me" (John 5:39). On the road to Emmaus, Jesus said to the two, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into His glory?' And beginning with Moses and all the prophets, He interpreted to them in all the Scriptures that things concerning Himself" (Luke 24:26–27).

The Old Testament contains many prophesies about Christ. Jesus said, "Everything written about Me in the Law of Moses and the prophets, and the Psalms must be fulfilled." The point is quite simple, according to Jesus. "Then He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures, and said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins should be proclaimed in His name to all nations" (Luke 24:45ff.).

The New Testament, especially the Gospels, is the accurate record of Jesus' life, death, resurrection and teaching, written by the power of the Holy Spirit. "These things I have spoken to you while I am still with you. But the helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you."

Jesus regards what is written in the Old Testament as true and accurate. "Have you never read what David did . . . ?" (Mark 2:25). Jesus regards Adam and Eve and the story of Jonah, Moses, etc., as actual people and events (Matt. 19:4ff.; 19:8).

Jesus believes that the writers of the Old Testament were inspired by the Holy Spirit. Jesus said, "David himself, in the Holy Spirit, declared, 'The Lord said to my Lord'" (Mark 12:36). His apostles had the same belief (Acts 4:25).

Jesus regards the Bible as the very Word of God and authoritative. "For truly, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the Law until all is accomplished" (Matt. 5:18).

Jesus believes that the commandments of the Old Testament are actually God's own. "You leave the commandment of God and hold to the tradition of men" (Mark 7:8).

Jesus regards the Scriptures as the very Word of God that cannot be contravened, questioned or trumped by human authority or reason. Jesus said, "Scripture cannot be broken" (John 10:35).

Jesus understands the Bible according to Law and Gospel (i.e., God's commands and God's gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation), which point to Him as Savior. Jesus piles on the Law when someone thinks the point of the Bible is works righteousness Continued on page 7

ON FASTING



Much has been written in many places, not the least of which is the Bible, on fasting. Read up on it.

Did you ever have anyone... encourage you to seriously consider fasting as part of a regular spiritual discipline? Neither did I.

But I am now: *seriously consider fasting as part of a regular spiritual discipline*. Fasting serves as a key tool toward significance in ministry.

Form of Fasting

There are many different forms you can use for fasting. You could eliminate one particular kind of food from your diet for a specified time. You could eat only bread and water for a day or a number of days. You could skip a meal or two.

I use a modified sun-up to sun-down approach. Once a week I do not eat anything after whatever snack I might have had in the evening before until dinner time the next day. It works out to not eating breakfast or lunch or any snacks for a day. This takes place generally on Monday, unless some special food is being planned by someone (birthday of a fellow staff member, lunch with a member, conference), then my fast will happen on Tuesday or Wednesday. On a fast day I limit myself to water and coffee— there is nothing spiritual about caffeine withdrawal!

How you fast is secondary to *that* you fast. Fasting in all its forms rests in the realm of adiaphora.

Purpose of Fasting

Fasting will loosen your grip on the world and tighten your grip on God. You will learn the truth of Jesus' retort to Satan, "Man does not live by bread alone but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God." You will come to see "how little" a thing food is compared to the surpassing greatness of God.

Fasting will free you. Food controls our lives more than we realize. Food is to the body what money is to the spirit. Too easily we let these gifts from God become gods in our life. Fasting serves to put food on notice that we will not be servant to it; we serve a living God not a table full of food.

Although it may help you to learn to control your eating the rest of the week, fasting is not dieting. It is spiritual discipline.

Make sure you intentionally connect your fasting with God. On your fast days spend extra time with God in his word and in prayer. Let the pangs in your stomach serve to teach your heart to yearn for the Lord.

Demeanor of Fasting

Jesus teaches that fasting should be done in secret. It is between us and God. Do not wear your fasting on your face or make a big deal of it to others.

Actually, the fewer people who know about your fasting the better. If someone invites you to lunch, gently demur and see if there is another day. Don't say, "I'd like to but this is my weekly fast." If treats are out in the office, don't bemoan the fact that this "always happens on my fast day." Just walk by the treats.

Jesus says, "Put oil on your head and wash your face, so that it will not be obvious to men that you are fasting." Your fast day should not be readily apparent to anyone else. Let this be a time of intimacy with God, a secret that only you and he share.

Reward of Fasting?

Jesus speaks about a reward when we fast. After he instructed his followers about the oil and the face washing, he continued, "... but only to your Father, who is unseen; and your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you."

What is the reward that comes with fasting?

Paul wrote a similar thing in his letter to Timothy. "For physical training is of some value (dieting), but godliness (fasting) has value for all things, holding promise for the present life and the life to come." (I Timothy 4:8)

What is the promise that grows out of the godly practice of fasting?

There is only one way to find out the answer....

Also, anyone who comes to Jesus empty-handed, begging for mercy, always goes away forgiven, healed, comforted (Mark 1:40ff., 2:1ff., 5:21ff., 7:24ff.)! See especially Jesus' story of the Pharisee and the tax collector (Luke 18:9ff.) and then that of the rich young ruler (Luke 18:18ff.). Jesus told the first "to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and treated others with contempt" (Luke 18:9). They'd missed the whole point of the Bible and Jesus!...

As sheep precious to the Savior, we recognize the Bible to be what Jesus did: the very Word of God. "Long ago, at many times and in many ways, God spoke to our fathers by the prophets, but in these last days He has spoken to us by His Son" (Heb. 1:1)."

If anyone has a truck and is available, on the 1st or 3rd Wednesday mornings of any month, will you please contact Joanne Vollbrecht if you know of anyone who can help in this situation please pass along our request. The pickup location is at the warehouse in the Hall Road and Groesbeck area.

We purchase the personal care items of bar soap, shampoo, toothpaste and toothbrushes if you care to contribute.

Our next food pantry meeting is Saturday, March 2nd at 10:00am in the conference room across from the food panty room and we are looking forward to seeing more new people.




Lutheran Women in Mission (LWML) Outreach for St. Paul Community Lutheran Church, Mission Grant #14

St. Paul Community Lutheran Church is a multi-cultural church, serving the diverse community of Pontiac, Michigan. In 2007, St. Paul Community Church reopened as a Lutheran Mission Church through the efforts of the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod (LCMS), Michigan District. Pontiac is the 20th largest community in Michigan with 30.7% of its residents living in poverty.

They seek to purchase a 15-passenger van for \$25,000 to enable them to transport parishioners to and from church, youth events, health care appointments and church sponsored activities. A van would help them serve Jesus by serving the community of St. Paul. A van will also provide transportation for St. Paul's parish nurse in her duties including taking members to doctors' visits, other medical appointments, and in home wellness checks. Having reliable transportation will help meet the people where they are with the gospel that changes lives (Matt.28:19-20). Please continue to contribute to your mite box to help fund this mission grant.






Fundraiser


